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### **A New Journey Begins for Hatua**

Five years ago, Hatua served 483 students. We now serve over 1,000 youth and families in Mombasa, including 271 alumni who are earning an average income that is more than 4 times their household income upon joining Hatua. **Projected outward, our alumni's increased lifetime income will be 20 times our investment in their education**. We are incredibly proud of our students and alumni and deeply grateful to our team, mentors, employer partners, and supporters who make this impact possible. Thank you!

Despite our successes, we are not stopping here. This year we engaged our stakeholders to shape our next five-year strategic plan. We will continue to enhance our student and alumni outcomes, and work to demonstrate Hatua's impact beyond the youth we serve, to their families. **We will extend our reach beyond Mombasa by helping youth-serving organizations across East Africa to incorporate soft skills training into their programs.** We will deepen locally rooted leadership within Hatua's team and Board, mobilize partners to invest in Hatua's transformative impact, and together, end generational poverty for those we serve.



## **EDUCATION**

### Hatua Now Serves 1,000 Youth & Families

In Jan we hit a major milestone when 120 new students joined Hatua, bringing our total number of youth and families served to over 1,000. With an average household income of Ksh.74 (\$0.57) per person per day the families we serve can't afford education. Thanks to Hatua's scholarship our students join secondary school, transition to tertiary, and graduate with professional credentials. In the process, they are excelling. In 2024, 74% of Hatua's secondary graduates qualified for degree programs, compared to 22.3% nationwide.

According to Kenya's Education Cabinet Secretary, the nation's transition rate was "only 30% from secondary to postsecondary education over the last few years." He blames this on "lack of adequate career guidance." To address this gap, **Hatua partnered with Kenya's University & College Placement Service and Higher Education Loan Board to host a public workshop** for recent high school graduates on how to apply for higher education and financing. A total of 2,500 youth attended in-person and via livestream.

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### Hatua Launches Open-Source Curriculum

On International Youth Day, we launched Skills for the Future — Hatua's open-source curriculum focused on communication, collaboration, emotional intelligence, problem-solving, and responsibility skills. **The curriculum, created through 3 years of design, testing, and iteration, is tailored to the needs of Kenyan youth and employers.** On average students start at *Level 1: Beginner*, and over the course of 9 units, progress to *Level 3: Developing*. All teaching resources are available for free at <u>curriculum.hataunetwork.org</u>.

In their final unit of Skills for the Future mentoring, **students work in teams to develop and implement a community service project.** They conduct interviews with community members to understand their challenges, develop a project plan and budget, mobilize support from stakeholders, and conduct a service project. In 2024, one student group led a campaign to prevent drug abuse among youth. They raised awareness about the risks of drug abuse by distributing fliers, giving talks in community centers, and organizing a prevention-themed football match.

### Hatua Peer Mentoring Reaches 9000+ Youth

Every year Hatua's recent high school graduates train as peer educators and deliver key elements of our Skills for the Future mentoring curriculum to secondary school students across Mombasa. **Our focus in 2024 was teen pregnancy prevention**, including the biology of pregnancy, prevention methods, impacts of teen pregnancy, the meaning of consent, and how to use assertive communication to ward off unwanted advances — in the process students practiced the core soft skills of self-awareness and responsibility.

This year, for the first time, we conducted peer education in all 6 subcounties of Mombasa. The activities were 100% student-led, with students sourcing schools, scheduling sessions, delivering the program, administering assessments, and conducting data entry to measure learning outcomes. In the process, our Gap Year students practiced their soft skills, on average progressing from *Level 3: Developing* to *Level 4: Proficient* across all 5 Hatua core competencies.

## CAREER GUIDANCE

### **Mentors Help Students Prepare for Careers**

In 2024, Hatua's mentor pairs grew by 22%, to 210 pairs. Mentors, each of whom work in the career field their mentee wants to pursue, engage one-on -one with their mentees throughout tertiary education, helping them to build their professional networks, upskill in their industries, source attachments, and transition from school into the workforce. This year **98% of Hatua's graduating students successfully completed a career-relevant attachment** before graduating, largely thanks to the support of our volunteer mentors.

Hatua's Student Unions (HSUs) are student-led chapters that bring together Hatua students attending the same university to create community, provide support, and conduct community service activities. In 2024, our 15 HSUs onboarded 84 new first-year members and partnered with 9 organizations to conduct 30 community service activities. These activities included school mentoring sessions, tree-planting events, and food drives for homeless families.



### Average Alumni Income Increases by 10%

48 new graduates joined our alumni community in 2024 marking the completion of their 9-year Hatua scholarship journey. Our alumni community now stands at 271 members across Kenya and abroad. Among our alums who graduated a year or more ago 91.6% are engaged in the workforce, **earning an average monthly income of Ksh.52,000 (\$400).** This is 6X the international poverty line and more than 4X the average household income of students who join our program.

Merceline earned a degree in Nutrition and is now an Asst. Production Manager at Food 4 Education, an NGO that provides nutritious lunches to students across 1,263 schools. She is among many Hatua alumni helping others access education and opportunity. 28 mentor Hatua tertiary students, and collectively, **our alumni are helping to pay school fees for 346 students.**

## Alumni Secure 18 Job Opportunities with Employer Partners

In 2024, our Employer Partners (EPs) shared 43 career opportunities with us, giving us the opportunity to refer candidates. **Hatua students and alumni secured an impressive 42% of these competitive job opportunities.** We also recorded high levels of satisfaction among our EPs with 35% of active EPs providing opportunities and seeking referrals more than once from Hatua.





Our students and alums are shining in the workplace. One of our Employer Partners, Nyali Capital, onboarded alums, Moses Kamande and Cynthia Akoth in 2024. According to Wanjiku Wambugu, CEO of Nyali Capital, "**Hatua produces employees who are diligent and persistent;** they constantly put in effort and determination to achieve goals even in the face of challenges."

### **Read-Aloud Expands to 4 New Schools**

Hatua's Read Aloud program aims to improve literacy rates while introducing important soft-skills to primary school students through weekly read-aloud sessions. **10,159 children participated in the program across Hatua's 2 community libraries and 13 schools,** including Likoni School for the Visually Impaired. This is part of our effort to make Hatua's library programs more inclusive for children with special needs. In addition, our Likoni community library provides students with a collection of 193 braille books.



### 135,753 Cups of nutritious porridge served in primary schools

Alongside literacy programs, our Libraries promote career guidance and employability skills. **Through our Network Bridge program local high school students' career questions are answered by Hatua alumni** who work in the profession they want to pursue. This year our alumni answered 300 questions. Meanwhile, Hatua's digital literacy skills program provided free training to 156 youth on how to use Office software and code using Python.




